#### What are you doing this Summer?

It is hard to believe that summer is almost upon us and soon, along with no school for our kids or grandkids and nicer weather, people will be enjoying a much-needed vacation or will get caught up in things like family reunions, camping, 4th of July celebrations, and other fun activities that we can only enjoy when the sun is shining regularly her in the beautiful state of Washington. That being said, I invite you to consider marking your calendars and joining us for some fun activities here at FELC and beyond. And please note that you are encouraged to invite your friends and neighbors to join us as well.

First of all, I know that there are lots of individuals in our congregation who enjoy

reading, so I thought it might be nice to offer a theological summer reading program (similar to the ones offered at public libraries when we were kids). Each month you will be encouraged to read a certain book (the title and description of each suggestion can be found elsewhere in this newsletter) and afterwards at the end of each month we will discuss what we learned. And just like the summer reading programs you may have enjoyed when you were a child, for each book you read and for each discussion you take part in, you will have the opportunity to earn a prize. On the last Thursday of each month, we will meet at church at 12pm to share what we learned. (*If anyone is interested in hosting an evening book group, please let us know*).

Second of all, if you haven't had a chance to watch the second season of *The Chosen* television series, you are invited to join us on Fridays at Noon to watch an episode per week. And being that most of us know the New Testament pretty well, you can always come and see what it is like. After each episode we discuss what we saw and learned, and we reflect on how the show brings the different Bible characters to life. Yes, popcorn is provided.

Next, along with watching *The Chosen*, we will be starting a Bible study based on the second season beginning on Sunday June 4th at 11:30am. Now, although I can't speak for everyone who attended the season 1 study, I feel that I need to let you all know that it was probably one of my favorite Bible Studies I have ever led. The director and writers of the show have done a fabulous job connecting the Bible and the characters we encounter in Scripture with the ones presented in the show. Again, if you have a good understanding of Scripture, you are welcome to participate in the study at any time.

Another event I invite you to consider participating in, that involves caring for the members and friends of FELC, is a visitation/communion giver group training on August 16th at 6pm (it should be still light outside.) If you would like to meet with some of our shut-ins, I'm certain many of them would enjoy having a few more visits than I am able to do on my own. During our time together we will discuss how you are to handle the blessed elements (wine/grape juice and bread) and where you can find them each week after worship. We can also talk about other opportunities or fun ways for us to stay connected with those who aren't able to make it to church anymore.

And if you are looking to do something fun with your kids or grandkids this summer, there are a number of activities being offered on Fridays at Edgewater Park (see details pg.6). Also, several churches in the area (including FELC) will be joining together to offer a Vacation Bible School from July 31st to August 3rd . Each day a meal will be offered at 5:00pm for the children and volunteers, an opening ceremony will be held around 5:30pm, the kids will than rotate to different classes (Bible time, Crafts, Games, Snacks), and we will end by 8pm after a brief closing ceremony.

Finally, since we are celebrating 50 years of being inside our beautiful church building and this gorgeous part of Mount Vernon, we hope you can join us for a church picnic on August 27th after worship. Members and friends of the church will be encouraged to bring a hotdish, snack, or salad to share, and hamburgers, hotdogs, cake, and beverages will be provided. And aside from enjoying some good food and fellowship, there will be Bingo with prizes and some outdoor games for the kids to play.

Hopefully, like me, you are looking forward to having some fun this summer! I don't know about you, but I can't wait to read some good books to help me grow in my faith and I am eager to explore more of *The Chosen* with you. Not to mention the fact that last year I enjoyed the excellent food and the stimulating conversations that were offered at our church picnic! So, please mark your calendars and don't forget to invite your friends, family, co-workers, neighbors to join us.

## There are a lot of good, Spirit inspired, things happening at First Lutheran.



Below you will find a list of the books we will be reading with a description provided by Amazon.

#### Book for June: Freeing Jesus by Diana Butler Bass

"The award-winning author of *Grateful* goes beyond the culture wars to offer a refreshing take on the comprehensive, multi-faceted nature of Jesus, keeping his teachings relevant and alive in our daily lives.

#### How can you still be a Christian?

This is the most common question Diana Butler Bass is asked today. It is a question that many believers ponder as they wrestle with disappointment and disillusionment in their church and its leadership. But while many Christians have left their churches, they cannot leave their faith behind. In Freeing Jesus, Bass challenges the idea that Jesus can only be understood in static, one-dimensional ways and asks us to instead consider a life where Jesus grows with us and helps us through life's challenges in several capacities: as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way, and Presence. *Freeing Jesus* is an invitation to leave the religious wars behind and rediscover Jesus in all his many manifestations, to experience Jesus beyond the narrow confines we have built around him. It renews our hope in faith and worship at a time when we need it most."

### Book for July: Searching for Sunday by Rachel Held Evans

"Are you struggling to connect with your church community? Do you find yourself questioning the core beliefs that you once held dear? *Searching for Sunday*, from *New York Times* bestselling author Rachel Held Evans is a heartfelt ode to the past and a hopeful gaze into the future of what it means to be a part of the modern church.

Like millions of her millennial peers, Rachel Held Evans didn't want to go to church anymore. The hypocrisy, the politics, the gargantuan building budgets, the scandals--to her, it was beginning to feel like church culture was too far removed from Jesus. Yet, despite her cynicism and misgivings, something kept drawing Evans back to church.

Evans found herself wanting to better understand the church and find her place within it, so she set out on a new adventure. Within the pages of *Searching for Sunday*, Evans catalogs her journey as she loves, leaves, and finds the church once again.

Evans tells the story of her faith through the lens of seven sacraments of the Catholic churchbaptism, confession, holy orders, communion, confirmation, the anointing of the sick, and marriage--to teach us the essential truths about what she's learned along the way, including: Faith isn't just meant to be believed, it's meant to be lived and shared in community. Christianity isn't a kingdom for the worthy--it's a kingdom for the hungry, the broken, and the imperfect. The countless and beautiful ways that God shows up in the ordinary parts of our daily lives. *Searching for Sunday* will help you unpack the messiness of community, teaching us that by overcoming our cynicism, we can all find hope, grace, love, and, somewhere in between, church."

#### Book for August: What is the Bible? How an Ancient Library of Poems, Letters, and Stories can Transform the Way You Think and Feel About Everything by Rob Bell.

"Rob Bell, the beloved author of *Love Wins* and *What We Talk About When We Talk About God*, goes deep into the Bible to show how it is more revelatory, revolutionary, and relevant than we ever imagined—and offers a cogent argument for why we need to look at it in a fresh, new way. *What Is the Bible?* provides insights and answers that make clear why the Bible is so revered and what makes it truly inspiring and essential to our lives.

Rob takes us deep into actual passages to reveal the humanity behind the Scriptures. You cannot get to the holy without going through the human, Rob tells us. When considering a passage, we shouldn't ask "Why did God say . . .?" To get to the heart of the Bible's meaning, we should be asking: "What's the story that's unfolding here and why did people find it important to tell it? What was it that moved them to record these words? What was happening in the world at that time? What does this passage/story/poem/verse/book tell us about how people understood who they were and who God was at that time?" In asking these questions, Rob goes beyond the one-dimensional question of "is it true?" to reveal the Bible's authentic transformative power. Rob addresses the concerns of all those who see the Bible as God's Word but are troubled by the ethical dilemmas, errors, and inconsistencies in Scripture. With *What Is the Bible?*, he recaptures the Good Book's magic and reaffirms its power and inspiration to shape and inspire our lives today."

#### Vacation Bible School (July 31<sup>st</sup>-August 3<sup>rd</sup>, 5pm to 8pm)

After reading Pastor Ryan's article, hopefully you were excited to hear that the churches in our area will be joining together to offer a Vacation Bible School this summer! That being said, please know that in order for us to help our little ones grow in their faith, we will need your support in all kinds of ways. So, you are invited to prayerfully consider how you might assist us with such a big, but rewarding, endeavor. And this little article is being written to plant the seed and to help you think about how you might be able to participate.

If you attended a VBS program as a child, or if you have been a helper in the past, you are probably aware that it practically takes a village to make it happen. Not only do you need lots of people willing to perform specific tasks (see list below), but to help offset costs there will most likely be a need for donated items such as: t-shirts, craft supplies, food, snacks, (a list will be made available in the church Enews soon). And of course, there wouldn't be a program without children, so it is vital that we spread the word and do our best to encourage our kids, grandkids, and the parents we know to participate.

Volunteers Needed: Director or Co-directors (to organize and run the event). Large group leaders or a master of ceremonies willing to lead the kids during the opening and closing sessions. Teachers to lead crafts and games/activities. Decorations Crew to help transform the church and meeting space. Snack Crew to provide a special snack each day. Publicity team to advertise and handle registration for the program. Guides/Chaperones to lead small groups of children through different class rotations (such as crafts, games, Bible time) Setup/Clean up Crew Dinner Crew will provide a meal for the kids and volunteers. (*We are hoping that each church can take one night*).

Although this all may seem a bit overwhelming, we are certain that with multiple churches joining forces we can make it happen! And please know that even if you can't assist us physically as a volunteer, perhaps you can donate some needed items, help us invite others, or pray for the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us. After all, Vacation Bible School programs can be an excellent opportunity to connect our children with God and help them experience his love and forgiveness through fun Biblical stories and activities.

Please read the following message from Pastor Gina Herman, who will be facilitating our Pride Participation efforts this year! We hope YOU and your congregation will be involved in your community!

As you know, June is PRIDE month, and there are a variety of different PRIDE events going on all around our synod *(see the list of PRIDE events near you below)*. Here are a few initial things to know about how our NWWA Synod will be involved in PRIDE this year:

1. We will be marching in the Seattle PRIDE parade again on **Sunday, June 25th**. There is once again a 200 person limit, so if there are folks in your congregation who would like to march with us, we ask that you find someone in your congregation to be a contact person who will keep track of those from your congregations who would like to march. 2. This year, we will be ordering and selling **NWWA PRIDE t-shirts!** That way, wherever and whenever you are involved in a PRIDE event near you, you can represent your church and our synod. Again, more info to come soon.

#### May is for Mothers

Actually, it should be written that May is for babies, but it didn't roll off the tongue the same way. The month of May we are asking the congregation to consider donating diapers, baby wipes, onesies, burp towels, baby food, and formula. These items are in high demand and are very costly (especially diapers!). Mothers, fathers, grandparents, and guardians could really use your help to ease their financial burden.



#### Lenten and Easter Outreach Offerings

Social Ministry would like to thank you, the congregation, for your generosity in donating kitchen items for the new housing unit in Mount Vernon. Martha's Place, which is run by the Catholic Community Services, received two truckloads of donations because of First Lutheran. One truckload was full of kitchen items and the second was filled with quilts from the quilting group. Another thank you needs to be sent directly to the quilting group, for all their hard work sewing and quilting over 50 quilts to keep people warm at Martha's Place.

We were also very blessed to make a donation of \$1338.68 to Martha's place, which came from the Lenten and Easter Offerings. Thank you for helping our community!

## Spring Quilt Distribution

The church quilters completed 56 twin size quilts, 8 baby quilts and one lap size quilt from November 2022 through April 2023. The quilts were blessed on April 30th and the twin size quilts were packed for delivery to Martha's Place. I am grateful to the following people who stayed after the worship service to help pack - Kathy Birch, Margie Holdt, Sharon Lauch, Carl Libbey, Heather Romano, and Barb Sneva. It is still to be decided who the recipients of the baby quilts and the lap quilt will be.

Anyone is welcome to join us on the second and fourth Thursdays to help finish the quilts. We are called the church quilters but no complicated sewing is involved on Thursdays; if you can tie a simple knot you possess all the qualifications needed. (If you really enjoy piecing quilt tops we have wonderful donated fabric to take and create at home, a 60"x80" quilt top for us.) Please consider helping in this worthwhile ministry of providing warm quilts for various agencies in our valley as well as contributing to Lutheran World Relief.

#### Friendship House Meal

First Lutheran has a consistent role in serving our homeless neighbors. Once per month, we gather supplies for a dinner to be served at both the *Friendship House Cafe* and now at *Skagit First Step* in Burlington. Thanks to your generosity!

Watch for a sign up sheet in the e news or on the refrigerator in the kitchen. We will be serving the evening meal at the Friendship House on May 3th, and again on June 27.



As spring and summer arrive we hope that you are able to get out and enjoy the beauty of God's Beautiful Creation.
