The Importance of Invitation

At the very beginning of Jesus' ministry, it is fairly obvious that inviting people into a relationship with God (and with those who accept that invitation) is an important part of our life of faith. In fact, before he begins to even preach and teach about God's Kingdom, he calls certain individuals to follow him and they in turn invite others. We observe this very idea in John's Gospel, when Philip invites Nathaniel to come and see if anything good can come from Nazareth after he finds out where Jesus is from. We must also try and remember that after his death and Resurrection Jesus commissions his disciples to go and make disciples of all nations, to baptize, and to teach them to obey everything he has commanded of them.

These days, I often wonder what is keeping followers of Christ from inviting other people to come check out the amazing and wonderful things God has to offer them through the body of Christ, which is made up of all believers. Is it because we are worried that they may turn down our invitation? Are we nervous or too timid to talk with others about the abundant life Jesus has graced us with, because we feel like we may be overstepping certain boundaries or intruding on an individual's privacy in some way? Do we fail to invite others into a journey of faith with Jesus, because we are worried about what to say or that we may be attacked for our beliefs? Is it because we don't think it is our responsibility or that we feel like others are more suited for the task?

Whatever our excuses might be, for our failure to follow the commission of Jesus to encourage others to join us in our communal relationship with God, we need to remember a few important things that God's Word teaches us about discipleship. First off, we have each been graced with the gift of the Holy Spirit in our baptisms and therefore we should try not to worry too much (I believe that all throughout Scripture we witness angels, and prophets, and Jesus telling people to not be afraid, to not worry, to not be troubled). Second of all, we should seek to be like the man (representing Christ) sowing seeds in the Parable of the Sewer in Matthew's Gospel. He tosses the seeds (representing God's word) everywhere without a concern of how they will grow (the growth is in God's hands after all) in the different soils they land in. And finally, the situations we find ourselves faced with in life always change, so even if someone has said no to an invitation in the past, it doesn't mean that they won't change their mind at some point.

After all the members & friends of First Lutheran have a lot of love and gifts to share with people inside and outside our church walls, and our God has even more to offer them! So let us do all that we can to always be the inviting and welcoming individuals our Lord has created us to be.

For the four Sundays in Advent (begins Nov. 27) we'll learn ELW 241, O Lord, How Shall I Meet You, anticipating Christmas Day.
