Unwrapping Jesus

Even now I can still recall a children's sermon that I preached years ago on Christmas Eve. As the kids came forward to the altar area, with joy and wonderment reflecting on their expectant faces, I invited them to sit down with me around a Christmas tree decorated with chrismons (ornaments that feature symbols and names representing Christ). And after initially greeting the children and asking them the reason for their illation that evening, I began to talk about the importance of names in the Bible and how often times certain individuals in scripture were given meaningful names that reflected a person's situation, or it revealed a particular character trait about them.

When growing up in Sunday school I remember learning that Issac's name meant "laughter" because his mother Sarah had laughed when she learned that she was going to have a child. I also can recall being taught that when Moses was a baby he was rescued by Pharoah's daughter from the Nile River and the meaning of his name, "to draw out of the water," reflected that event. And of course, as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ and hear the familiar story of how his conception would come about, we are reminded that Mary was told by her angelic visitor to name her baby Jesus, which in Hebrew means "God saves!"

My little Christmas homily that night continued with me showing the children some of the ornaments on the tree and explaining the different names and symbols embroidered on them that represented Christ. And after reminding the kids that Jesus is Immanuel (God with Us), and after clarifying the meaning behind symbols like the Alpha and Omega (God is the first and the last), I asked them what names they had for our Lord. Which is actually a question I invite the members and friends of First Lutheran to consider this year as we enter into the Season of Advent.

So, let me ask you, what names do you have for Jesus and how do those names impact the relationship you have with God and with the people in this world created in His image? Perhaps you view Christ as your good shepherd leading you through life? Maybe you see Jesus as the lamb whose blood has set us free from our sins? Or perhaps you understand the Lord to be a good friend who has always been there for you in the good times and bad. And yet, no matter how we might perceive Jesus to be working in our lives, I would imagine that the more we get to know the Lord the more our understanding of God expands and grows.

With that being said, I am hoping that as we prepare for Christmas and everything that comes with it, that we will also take some time to unwrap who Jesus is to us and how that impacts the ways in which we live out our faith. And to help us do this, I will be offering several different meaningful opportunities to help us in this endeavor. For example: A special advent devotional called, "Unwrapping the Names of Jesus," will be available for purchase for \$10 (*the church will have some copies on hand, or you can find it on Amazon*). Also, each week during worship a special printed ornament, that coincides with each candle on the advent wreath, will be handed out to people of all ages. And I am hoping to offer a special advent craft and Christmas movie night on December 14th with popcorn and other holiday treats.


