we are nurtured, prepared, and sent to be the light of Christ in our world.

As Lutherans one of our strongest theological understandings of God comes through our understanding of Grace. For my article this month I thought it would be fun to make an acronym of the word and define it through the letters that spell it out in steps. The first step we find in grace is for us to **g**o to God! We need to learn to let go of our pride and/or the things that keep us from turning to him. Whether we believe we are worthy or not, God wants us to come to him. Although there are many things that keep us from having a relationship with him we can ask God to give us the power to get rid of them and to open our eyes to recognize them. As we acknowledge and recognize the obstacles in our lives keeping us from him, we can ask God to accept us, to forgive us, and to heal us. We need to also remember that God will help draw us to him. In John's Gospel Jesus tells the Jewish authorities "No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me.."

The next step in helping us grow in Christ is for to **r**emember who we really are, and who's we are! We need to let go of everybody else's' ideas of who we ought to be. If I had listened to the opinions of my roommates after college and given them the power to determine who I was, I would have never gone to Seminary! Similarly, we can't let our mistakes or successes define us, because no one is perfect, we all our sinners, and God looks beyond our sins and knows who we truly are because he made us! He is our heavenly Father and we are his children! Even when we make mistakes in life our earthly parents forgive us and want what is best for us, the same is true for God!

The third step to help us grow in Christ is to **a**cept that you are accepted! Let go of feelings that you are not good enough, or that you have to prove yourself in some way. God's grace is given to us freely and cannot be earned. Accept God's word to Jesus in Matthew's Gospel as a word to you. After Jesus is baptized a voice came from heaven saying, "You are my beloved son with whom I am well pleased!" Although we may not have audibly heard a similar voice at our own baptisms, I am willing to bet that God said the same thing about each and every one of us! We don't know if Jesus did a lot of great things before he stepped out of the Jordan River, but we do know that he did a lot of amazing things afterwards! God was pleased with him before he did miraculous things as he is pleased with us even before we do great things because he knows the potential that we have!

The fourth step in removing obstacles that prevent our growth in Christ is to **c**onnect with a Christian community. Churches provide us with more than worship on Sundays mornings, or with Bible studies, or small groups during the week! They provide us with friends and family with whom we share a common faith and desire.

The people we surround ourselves with can make a huge impact on us in either a negative way or a positive way. We need to learn to let go of the friendships that reinforce the wrong things in us. If we are around others who share our beliefs we can support one another in love, and we can also encounter Jesus in one another. Remember Christ said "Where two or three are gathered there I will be..."

The final step in our growth in Christ is to embrace the life God is giving you! Let go of images of yourself that are less than God's image in you. Embrace your life as you are, as God made you with your strengths and weaknesses. A friend of mine was afraid of going to Seminary and didn't think that she could be a Pastor, "when all of a sudden she said it was almost as if she heard laughing in the back of her mind." Something inside of her reminded her that with God all things are possible! God will give you what you need to grow in Christ, so put your trust in him! This month let us reflect and meditate on God's amazing gift of Grace that helps us to grow in our faith and closer to him.

Reopening plan update

Hello again FELC,

I hope you are safe and healthy whether you are home or back out and about again. Skagit County has entered phase 2 and we are seeing some reopening happening around the Valley. But unfortunately, at the same time we are also seeing COVID cases rising again. Even though we could technically hold a Worship in the Sanctuary again, Council has decided to keep the Church closed for in-person activity through July.

We really want to be back in the building to see all of you again, but we feel it's still safer to stay on our current plan of a very slow and methodical plan to eventually reopen. The Skagit County Health Department and Synod continue to request that we do not meet in-person unless it's absolutely necessary. With Pastor Ryan, David Jones, and many others contributing to our wonderful online Worship videos, we will continue to use that as our primary form of Worship for now.

After some conversation with the radio station, we have also been able to get through all the technical hurdles with the radio program, and we are once again broadcasting current Worship. The radio program is a week behind the videos as it was when we were Worshiping in-person, as it takes some time to cut the audio down to fit our time slot once the video is completed each week. But, if you are unable to watch the Worship videos, you can tune into KAPS 660AM on Sundays at 8am to listen instead.

We've been talking about it for a few months now, but I think we will finally have our first drive-up worship in July! Drive-up Worship will be in addition to our online and radio options, it will not replace them, so you'll have many options to choose from each week.

We thank you for bearing with us as we make decisions month to month right now as it seems we take a step forward but then two steps back with this pandemic. While we want everything to go back to "normal" as soon as possible, it's been exciting to see how we can be the Church outside of the walls of our building. We may never go fully back to the old normal before all of this, but I think we can make the new normal even better at FELC with all of things we are learning right now!

Thank you for your continued giving to First Lutheran Church. As of June 30,2020, we received a total of \$116,666.63 and spent \$128,012.47 for the year so the negative balance of \$4,039.28 from the May has been increased by \$7,306.56. Our year-to-date balance as of June 30 would have been negative \$11,345.84 but because we received the Payroll Protection Program Loan, we were able to charge the June salaries in the amount of \$10,493.67 to the loan so our Year to Date ending balance as of 6/30/2020 is negative \$852.17. In June, we were notified the Payroll Protection Program Loan from the SBA through the federal CARES Act that we received in May is now being extended from 8-weeks of salary costs to 24-weeks of salary costs for both the church and preschool for as long as the awarded balance is not exhausted. If we meet the loan requirements, part or all the loan will be forgiven. We will know if all is forgiven later in the summer when the bank determines if we met all their requirements. Please keep the financial part of stewardship in mind as the summer progresses. We will exhaust the loan shortly and with your financial giving, we will be able to continue to meet our benevolences and monthly expenses. ***Per FELC Policy and Procedure manual, an internal audit is due for 2019. Please let me know if you would like to work with me to perform this financial review.***

Welcome Statement and Social Justice

You are created uniquely by God and you are welcome here.

Your Abilities • Age • Culture • Economic Status • Gender Expression/Identity • Life Circumstances • Marital Status • Questions • Race • Sexual Orientation • are welcome here.

We are very focused on Coronavirus and the efforts to keep us healthy during this pandemic, and rightly so with how it has greatly affected our lives. But at the same time, I'd like us to not lose focus on living into our welcome statement and social justice issues that are happening in our country and world.

With June being pride month, I'd like to acknowledge the supreme court decision on LGBTQIA+ rights under the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which is a major victory for equality in our country. This is an excerpt from ELCA Presiding Bishop Eaton's statement on this ruling:

"St. Paul writes, "If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it" (1 Corinthians 12:26). The June 15 decision brings the civic body a step closer to the cherished American value of equal rights for all. There is more work to be done to guarantee equal rights for LGBTQIA+ people beyond the workplace — in housing, medical care and military service. We are committed to this work as we celebrate, during Pride Month and all year round, the gifts of our LGBTQIA+ siblings."

The second subject I'd like to talk about is racial equality after the death of George Floyd and the subsequent protests and social justice changes that have happened in the last month. I know we are isolated from most of this being in a predominantly white community and Congregation, but if we really want to be able to welcome people of all races into our Congregation, we really need to educate ourselves.

The ELCA reaffirmed commitment to combat racism and white supremacy, which was signed by Presiding Bishop Eaton and all Synod Bishops, including Bishop Shelly Bryan Wee. Here is a portion of that statement:

The ELCA's social policy resolution, "Condemnation of White Supremacy and Racist Rhetoric," adopted by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, states: "As persons called to love one another as God has loved us, we therefore proclaim our commitment to speak with one voice against racism and white supremacy. We stand with those who are targets of racist ideologies and actions." As church, together we must work to condemn white supremacy in all forms and recommit ourselves to confront and exorcize the sins of injustice, racism and white supremacy in church and society and within ourselves as individuals and households

Dear Beloveds of the Northwest Washington Synod,

Growing up close to an Indian reservation, I saw families living without electricity or plumbing. In the last year I have seen children crying, alone, without parents, because they were forcibly

separated at the border. In March and April and May I saw families lined up to receive food at pantries because they had no other choice due to lack of work during the COVID crisis. In the last few weeks I have watched the video of George Floyd being murdered too many times. This last weekend I watched people carefully keep their masks on their faces while they lifted their fists to the sky marching for justice. And I have seen violence where there should have been unity. I am sad and tired and heavy hearted. I am reminded of Jesus' words in the gospel of Matthew, *"Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these, you did it to me."*

Dear Beloveds, in the Northwest Washington Synod we tell ourselves that we are open to all people, love all people, care for all people, and are church for everyone. But Beloveds, as a community, we have failed. We have been complicit in our silence. We have been cowardly instead of courageous. We have lived in our privilege without acknowledging the systemic racism that we swim in every day of our life. Today we are called to confess that we have fallen far short of God's call to love and care for those whose lives are sacred in this world, whose brown and black bodies were made in the image of God, whose very lives are in danger because those of us with privilege and power ignore or decide that "they" are too much trouble for "us."

This is our confession.

But let us not move too quickly to absolution. While I am all for forgiveness, sometimes I think forgiveness becomes a way to pretend that the injury never happened. So, let us sit in this time for a while – even if it makes us uncomfortable. Even as we lament. You see, we cannot jump from an easy "I'm sorry" to a half-hearted "we're now all back together again." If we do this, we are offering forgiveness without discipleship, grace without the cross.

The COVID-19 pandemic has ripped open the wounds that we have had in this country since before its inception. Black and brown bodies – slaves and

immigrants and native peoples – have all been abused by those in power. And, we must confess, for most of this history, those in power have been white.

There is no place in this world for anyone to brutally murder another without care and without consequence. There is no place in this world where bystanders cannot intervene because they are afraid they might receive the same treatment as the one being hurt or murdered before them. Many of us as children learned the story of the Good Samaritan. How many times are we going to walk on the other side of the road?

My Beloveds in Christ, we are called to work towards God's true peace and justice in our ministry sites, our church, and our society by first, confessing our own sin, and then mindfully acting against racism and violence of all kinds. I encourage you to confess and to act. Here are some ideas as we walk forward, towards reconciliation:

- Take the Intercultural Development Inventory to understand and build cultural competence. <https://idiinventory.com/>
- Participate in anti-racism training.
- Assist the members of your congregation or ministry site in accessing resources about racism, white privilege, and ensuring God's vision of justice for all.
- Encourage people to vote, and vote yourself, keeping in mind Jesus' commandment of loving God and loving people.
- Accompany and empower those who are already thought leaders in your community.
- Financially support organizations that are working in the field of anti-racism.
- Financially support businesses owned by people of color.
- Wear a mask to protect people of all races, especially protecting those most vulnerable.
- Work towards economic justice for all.

Discover other ways that lead to God's kingdom of real peace and justice.

As we continue to be patient in entering church buildings, let us be church in the world. May we live into the words of 1 John 3:18, *"Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action."* And may we pray for true reconciliation and God's wholeness and peace.
